Ministry Message from Jen Radford

St Hilda's, Hunt's Cross through Covid-19 20/5/21

I asked Colin if he had any particular requests for the message this time and he said it'd be good to hear how things have been through Covid-19 at St Hilda's and how

services have happened. Firstly, I should say that as a reader serving alongside my husband Andy, the Team Vicar I am super grateful to God for the opportunity. Through the course of this Covid year, as my reader training came to an end and I was licensed, I found I had more time to serve God in my local community at St Hilda's. In January I began a small part-time role as Parish Coordinator for the PCC here, fulfilling God's call further and supporting Andy particularly with developing the mission and ministry in this area of Hunts Cross and Halewood. So, I'm again hugely blessed and grateful to God to be able to share with you about ministry here and some of our hopes for the future.



St Hilda's Online services have occurred

every Sunday since soon after Easter 2020, when we switched from the single team YouTube recorded service to two Zoom services. We were concerned about those not able, comfortable or confident about accessing Zoom services and so Andy created a paper version which was emailed out. He printed hard copies too which he and our daughter Ella, who's a sporty 17yr old, took out to those without email each week. Andy also spent time supporting various congregants via telephone, enabling some to access Zoom via their devices. Our original Zoom service took place at 11am for around an hour where we enjoyed a mixture of styles incorporating elements from each of the Platform 1 and Platform 2 services, and prayers and readings by volunteers from both congregations. Since the beginning of lockdown many of St Hilda's congregation have kept in touch with one another via the Church WhatsApp group, created from a group I'd set up with the leaders of platform 2. We have shared photos, jokes, encouragements, prayer requests, news and support with one another, a fantastic way to get to know each other better. Andy also created an admin-only WhatsApp group to deliver a short thought for the day video throughout the week, encouraging many. He facilitated a number of 24-hour prayer marathons, as a church and across the team, where we were lifting up members of our congregation or their family and friends through difficult times.

We became increasingly aware that our single Zoom service was not so suitable for our children and young people, who rarely attended. So, at the beginning of October St Hilda's began a dedicated 'Platform 2' Zoom service at 4pm which continued until last Sunday. These Zooms included sharing news, prayers, contemporary worship,

action songs, a bible reading and talk, craft, video clips, games and quizzes. Many of our children and young people have participated and contributed at different times since then, ably cheered on by the Platform 2 leadership team.

St Hilda's church has pulled together throughout this time in a variety of ways. We've phoned, messaged and connected with each other safely since the first lockdown and baked cakes for each other and the soldiers who manned the test centre we hosted in the church building. The daughter of one congregant has regularly run a Zoom bingo session. This year we've added a mid-week Zoom 'cuppa' opportunity where we discovered there are a number of gifted knitters in church. The knitting team produced large numbers of 'hens' which we put cream eggs in for Easter and most recently lots of 'doves' to gift to families for Pentecost. Last summer two parishioners led Zoom aerobics sessions, we've had Zoom quizzes, a game show, a pancake party and Zoom Easter garden building. We were also able to deliver bags of little goodies to folks' doors at Christmas and Easter to keep in

touch. A number of St Hilda's folk have enjoyed engaging with Wednesday evening Team Night Prayer and also the Team Lent Course which Andy and I ran based on Bishop Steve Croft's book, 'Experiencing God's Love'. So many folks have kindly

shared their time and talents generously throughout the year.

Just before I began preparing this message, I noticed that an orchid I received from a kind parishioner, in full bloom not so long before the first lockdown, had begun to regrow a number of buds. I've been giving it a very small drink once a week for an extensive period of time. I realise I'd become so used to watering a fruitless plant that I'd forgotten to look for signs of new life. You'll notice (see above) the picture of it now, as I complete this article. It's absolutely blooming gorgeous! It's been more than worth my small efforts and reminds me of the great outcomes which God can produced when we all choose to faithfully remain in relationship with him, doing the small things he's given us to do. My prayer for St Hilda's – and all our churches as I recently prayer-walked the Team's buildings in the rain, admiring the lush green spaces between – is that we emerge from lockdown noticeably 'blooming' somehow. Wouldn't it be amazing if more folk in our communities were able to see and experience '... the glory of the Lord, the splendour of our God' (Isaiah 35:2b) through us or with us, after such a trying time?

We've got lots of forthcoming plans and hopes as a church family now. This weekend we are set to hold two garden afternoon tea parties for Christian Aid and try the first live Platform 2 service at 4pm in the hall. For July we're planning a church barbeque to celebrate local community heroes and in September we intend to open St Hilda's as an all-age 'Place of Welcome' on Wednesday afternoons. There are lots of other ideas floating around too, so watch this space and if you'd be so kind, add your prayers to ours. Thanks so much for reading. Jen x





D-Day
veteran, 95,
parachutes
into France to
mark
Anniversary

A 95-year-old D-Day veteran joined many paratroopers as they reenacted the first airborne drop on to northern France

75 years ago. Thousands of troops dropped in to Nazi-occupied Normandy in June 1944, ahead of the assault on the beaches. About 20 Dakota aircraft flew from Duxford, Cambridgeshire, to France, with veterans Harry Read, 95, from Bournemouth, and John Hutton, 94, from Stirling, Scotland, among the troops. The pair jumped in tandem with members of the Army's Parachute Regiment display team, the Red Devils, and were greeted with applause as they landed in the fields.

Colin had also borrowed a book of Blessings for over 300 occasions but hadn't found one that covered park benches. Instead he read us a poem that Allan would have loved and which certainly amused those listening.

Joanne and Michelle cut the ribbon and just about everyone had a chance to sit on the bench after Joanne had thanked everyone who had helped ensure the bench was installed.



PEACE DOVES AT LIVERPOOL CATHEDRAL

A huge art installation has finally been unveiled at Liverpool Cathedral.

Peace Doves is a mass participation art installation, created by renowned sculptor and artist Peter Walker.

It features around 18,000 paper doves suspended on 15.5 miles of ribbon from the roof of the Cathedral, accompanied by a soundscape from composer David Harper. It was originally scheduled to open last May but was postponed in the wake of the coronavirus pandemic.





the cathedral, along with local school children and community groups were invited to write messages of peace, hope and love onto thousands of paper doves.

The installation is breathtaking - the doves are illuminated by atmospheric, ever-changing lighting while David Harper's score manages to create a peaceful and moving ambience.

The Dean of Liverpool, The Very Revd Dr Sue Jones, said: "I have been reading some of the prayers and messages written on the doves from people, both young and old, they are incredibly moving.

"From people paying tribute to those they have lost, to those wishing for better times and, of course, many wishing for peace.

"I hope that people will visit the installation and appreciate its beauty. I hope that people will come and stand, sit or lie under installation and look up at the doves and experience a sense of serenity and peace.

"As a cathedral, we offer this space and this installation for you to reflect on the difficult times we have all been living through and we pray it will give comfort and joy." Prior to lockdown, visitors to the cathedral, along with local school children and community groups were invited to write messages of peace, hope and love onto thousands of paper doves.

Peter Walker added: "This is the first artwork to be shown since the Cathedral re-opened and it has been created by the hands of the local community.

"Thousands of children have participated in this project, writing messages of peace, hope and love onto the doves and I think that's a really important thing to be doing at this time."

As well as Peace Doves, visitors to the cathedral will also be able to

view the return of the popular Angel Wings moving light projection, created by Luxmuralis.

Visitors can take photos and videos in front of the shoulder height, angel wings that pulsate and change colour to a curated soundtrack. Peace Doves was created by sculptor and artist Peter Walker (Image: PA) Another new, interactive art installation also going on display is Peace to Ourselves.

Visitors will be asked to place a button inside the shape of a giant dove and take a



moment to contemplate the past year and remember those who have lost their lives. The installation officially opens on Friday, May 20 and will also feature as part of Liverpool's LightNight event that evening.

It will run until August 31 2021, with a series of special events, including talks, music, storytelling for children, yoga and the chance to dine under the doves. There are also a series of Quiet Hours for those who might find crowds daunting, for example, someone who has an autism spectrum condition or sensory processing differences.

Due to COVID regulations, bookings must be made in advance to view the installation.. Further slots will be released later this month. Visit Liverpool Cathedral's website for updates and a full listing of all the special events.





Whitsun, "Whitsunday" and "Whit Sunday"

Begins 7th Sunday After Easter 2021 date 23 May

Related to Pentecost, Whit Monday, Whit Tuesday, Whit Friday, Trinity Sunday

Whitsun (also Whitsunday or Whit Sunday) is the name used in Britain and Northern Ireland, and throughout the world among Catholic, Anglicans and Methodists, for the Christian High Holy Day of Pentecost. It is the seventh Sunday after Easter, which commemorates the descent of the Holy Spirit upon Christ's disciples (Acts 2).



In the North West of England, church and chapel parades called whit walks still take place at this time. Typically, the parades include brass bands and choirs; girls attending are dressed in white. Traditionally, Whit fairs (sometimes called Whitsun ales) took place. Other customs, such as Morris dancing, were associated with Whitsun. Pentecost was so-called to signify the outpouring of the wisdom of the Holy Ghost on Christ's disciples. As the first holiday of the summer, Whitsun was one of the favourite times in the traditional calendar, and Whit Sunday, or the following week, was a time for celebration. This took the form of fêtes, fairs, pageants and parades, with Whitsun ales and Morris dancing in the south of England and Whit walks, Club Days and wakes in the

north. Whit Monday was officially recognised as a bank holiday in the UK in 1871, but lost this status in 1972 when the fixed Spring Bank Holiday was created.

kettle boiling offering tea and coffee and biscuits; seats out as rain gradually disappeared and surprise! surprise! A glamorous masked lady parked opposite and helped her mum Sheila Bersin out of her car for her

first social visit since lockdown.

In fact, for all of us, it seemed to be our first "coming out" experience and it was awesome. So much conversation and sharing of photos of gardens.

We are so glad that we were not allowed to use the back garden for our fundraising event as this resulted, for us, in a very creative use of a very limited space which we loved.

Ray Connor–Funeral eulogy- 27th April 2021 By Colin Critchley

50 years next year a young Anglican clergyman came to St Mary's. John Farnworth was a quiet unassuming man from Blackburn but he left a legacy because he was the driving force in starting a playgroup which evolved into the Nursery. One of his other legacies is a sermon he preached nearly fifty years ago. It has been formative for me. He was addressing the issue of Christian life- style and he used maritime imagery to paint the backcloth. He drew the contrast between a large ocean liner and a tug boat. The liner gets all the attention with its size, its glamour, its status. John said that there can be an expectation that the life of a Christian is to be modelled on that of a liner, obvious, somewhat flambovant and striking. He then pointed out that without the tug the



liner is going nowhere, he said that not many can be liners but the tugs are the lifeblood of the seas.

Ray had no aspirations to be a liner he didn't need to be he was a brilliant tug, despite a difficult start in life.

Ray was born and raised in the Dingle area of Liverpool, one of 10 children, 2 of whom died in infancy. His mother Edith died when Ray was 6 years old, and his father William (Billy) was in poor health. His father was not able to care for his children alone and the youngest, Eileen was only 6 weeks old. All the children were placed into the care of Fazakerley Cottage Homes, Longmoor Lane except for Eileen who was placed in the nursery unit in Olive Mount Hospital.

Later Billy remarried to Peggy who brought Eileen back home. They cared for her and each child who returned home on reaching 14 years to the care of their father and stepmother. Peggy and Billy had 2 daughters making the number of children up to 10. Ray remained in the Cottage Homes, where he was happy. until he was 14 but saw his father every weekend. Ray attended Barlows Lane School and Fazakerley secondary where he passed his school, certificate in all subjects. Billy died just before Ray went home permanently and he remained there for 3 years whilst an office boy in a Liverpool Firm of accountants.

He joined the Royal Army Pay Corps aged 17 a regular soldier because they got paid more than if you did National Service. He was stationed in Malaya during

the Malayan conflict attached to the Brigade of Gurkhas. He loved the time he was in the Army and that was where he learned all his bookkeeping skills.

He then came back to Liverpool and had various jobs and joined Cousins Confectioners as an assistant accountant when they had a bakery in the Dingle area and finally moved to their new bakery in Woodend Ave Speke. Val joined the firm later and worked in the Wages/Cash office from where their relationship developed, and they married in October 1963.

Their first married home was in Prescot in a flat over one of Cousins shops. They moved to Halewood in 1966. By then the family had grown to 4 and became 5 by 1967. That was their first contact with St Mary's when Kerry was baptized. Cousins closed down in 1981 and Ray was made redundant as he didn't want to move to Yorkshire with the rest of the company managers. He found a position with a firm of accountants who were independent accountants for Littlewoods Pools and the Moores family. Ray worked there for many years working on The Moores family Trust funds as well as Pool's winners.

Ray was a staunch Evertonian and followed the team from boyhood until his passing. He had a season ticket and went to every match as well as Wembley trips, mostly with his 3 children and Val's family who were all blues. There were a few who supported the other team.

For many years Ray was treasurer for St Mary's Church, St Mary's Day Centre and St Mary's Nursery. He was involved in the setting up of the Day Centre with Rev Alister Ross and Rev Paul Dear. He has been a member of St Mary's for well over 40 years and latterly was electoral roll officer.

My life and Ray's overlapped on a number of fronts, in particular concerning the Nursery. Ray's management of the finances was impeccable and on more than one occasion h took on the Inland Revenue and the Diocese on behalf of the Nursery. He visited the Inland Revenue in Widnes and managed to get a letter from them stating that neither the Church or staff would be pursued for unpaid tax and NI contributions provided accounts were produced and staff were paid under the PAYE arrangements. Ray made sure that accounts were regularly and properly produced! What a man, no limelight just solid, conscientious application of skills developed over years.

By nature Ray was a quiet introverted personality, somewhat shy until he got to know you. I found that our relationship blossomed around hearing aids of all things. We regularly compared the effectiveness of the models we were using. When leading a service I always used Ray a the barometer of sound level, his body language indicated whether the sound was right!

Ray was a family man and family holidays were always enjoyed by grandchildren every year, paid for by Grandad and Nan both at home and abroad. He loved Elvis Presley and country music and would listen to the same records over and over. Ray's financial wizardry was much appreciated by his family especially during their later life as each of them can manage their financial affairs and save and have no debt. Although he was careful with the family money, he was very generous and always made sure his family were well looked after. Family meant everything to him,

and he supported them all in everything they wished to do. He never tired in assisting them to make the best decisions. Like most fathers he would take them anywhere they wished to go and was always driving them around.

Val always felt loved and appreciated and he always put her welfare before his own. The day before he passed away, he reminded her to order her medication, he worried about how she would manage and put a lot of effort into making things as easy as possible in the event of his passing.

to have a go...but first you need the pallets. Neighbours had work done and the workers were pleased to get rid of the pallets. It is not easy to deconstruct pallets with the sort of tools you have at home but I finally managed with a chisel, a mallet and a claw hammer. Then I had to nail on some of the reclaimed pieces to create my 'tubs'. A couple of coats of paint from the tin used to paint the shed trim (a third would be good but I couldn't wait!) I bought a roll of the weed suppressing membrane and sewed bags which were stapled to the inside of the structure and then filled with compost. Then I planted with geranium, mimulus and baby spider plants. Maybe not fully eco or perfectly done but I am very pleased with it.
