Commonwealth War Graves in St Nicholas' Churchyard

The Commonwealth War Graves Commission ensures that 1.7 million people who died in the two world wars will never be forgotten. There are cemeteries and memorials at 23,000 locations, in 154 countries and nine of these graves are in our churchyard. This leaflet contains a map of their location and brief details about the individuals.

We also have a civic war memorial at the church entrance.

War Graves

- <u>1 Arthur Bates</u> Arthur was a Private in the 17th Battalion, South Lancashire Regiment. He died on 22 March 1919 at the age of 33.
- **<u>2 William Bishop</u>** William was a Private in the Labour Corps. He lived in "The Barracks in Lower Road. He died on 24 February 1920 at the age of 36.
- <u>3 Edward Molyneux Cohan</u> Edward was a Second Lieutenant in the Royal Field Artillery, 1st West Lancashire Brigade. He died aged 25 on 5 August 1914. He died as a result of a horse riding accident on Salisbury Plain.
- <u>4 David Pickavance</u> David lived at "Ashton Hey" Halewood and served as a Signalman in the Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve on HMS Vivid. He died of illness aged 18 on 29 September 1918.
- <u>5 Stanley Jones</u> Stanley lived in Aigburth and served in the 6th King's (Liverpool Regiment), Rifles Battalion, where he became a Corporal. He lost a leg in Flanders and died of his wounds on 20 October 1916 at the age of 21. He was awarded the Military Medal for his bravery.
- <u>6 Callum Craig Munro Bell</u> Callum was a Second Lieutenant in the Royal Air Force. He died age 19 on 16 August 1918. According to his gravestone this was a result of an accident when flying.
- <u>7 Arthur Harding</u> Gunner Arthur Harding served in the Royal Artillery, 7th Light AA, 50th Battery. He died as a result of an accident in Scotland on 11 October 1942 aged 22.
- <u>8 William Noel Macintosh</u> William lived in Halewood and served in the Royal Air Force Volunteer Reserve as an Aircraftsman 2nd Class. He died of illness on 10 June 1941 at the age of 34.
- <u>9 William Alfred Littledale Fletcher</u> William was born on 26 August 1869 and became a Lieutenant Colonel in the King's (Liverpool Regiment) 2nd/6th Rifle Battalion. He was made Chevalier of the Legion of Honour and awarded the DSO and Bar. He had served in the South African War with the Imperial Yeomanry. He died on 14 February 1919 aged 49.
